AFFIDAVIT OF N. RIELLE CAPLER

- I, N. RIELLE CAPLER, Doctoral student, Interdisciplinary Studies Graduate Program, UBC, Vancouver Campus, #270-2357 Main Mall, H. R. MacMillan Building, Vancouver, British Columbia, MAKE OATH AND SAY AS FOLLOWS, THAT:
- 1. I am the co-investigator and Project Lead in the Cannabis Access Regulations Study (CANARY), a nationwide study looking at the impact of the changes in the federal medical cannabis regulations (MMAR to MMPR) on patient access to medical cannabis in Canada (http://Canarystudy.ca) and as such I have personal knowledge of the matters of facts hereinafter depose to save and except for same as stated to be made upon information and belief, in which case I verily believed to be true.
- 2. Now produced and marked as Exhibit "A" to this my Affidavit is a copy of my Curriculum Vitae.
- 3. I am the Co-investigator on this study and am acting as the project lead. I have collected the data and will be analyzing the data as part of my doctoral dissertation in Interdisciplinary Studies at the University of British Columbia. Now produced and

marked as Exhibit "B" to this my Affidavit is a copy of "The CANARY Research Team" document.

- 4. The study utilizes mixed methodologies, collecting both quantitative and qualitative data in the form of surveys and interviews. This is a prospective study, looking at changes over time during the first year of implementation of the *MMPR*. The baseline survey was completed by 450 people between March and May, 2014. There were 34 interviews conducted between May and July 2014. We have recently conducted a follow up survey (November/December) and will be engaging in follow up interviews this month. Now produced and marked Exhibit "C "to this my affidavit is a copy of the CANARY Interview Guide Baseline and now produced and marked Exhibit "D " to this my affidavit is a copy of CANARY Survey Baseline.
- 5. The study was open to current medical cannabis users and those who weren't currently using cannabis but had medical conditions that would qualify for use. Respondents were asked about their current sources of cannabis, their satisfaction with those sources, use patterns, knowledge of Health Canada's program and of medical cannabis more generally, as well as health outcomes and health service utilization.
- 6. The data has not yet been cleaned for analysis nor analyzed. The following information provides relevant rough descriptive information from the raw data.
- 7. 85% of respondents (409) were current users. Current medical cannabis users were authorized under either the *MMAR* the *MMPR* or were not authorized under either program (48%, 16% and 36% respectively).
- 8. In regards to source, it is clear that many patients are accessing from dispensaries and other sources regardless of their status with the *MMAR* or *MMPR*. Of those authorized under the *MMPR* at baseline, about half were accessing from sources other than a licensed producer, with approximately one third accessing from medical cannabis dispensaries. The same pattern holds for the follow-up surveys.
- 9. About half of respondents that were registered with the MMPR at baseline report being somewhat or completely satisfied with the program, with approximately half

reporting poor or very poor availability of product, and strongly disagreeing or disagreeing that the costs under this program are affordable.

10. The interviews provide first-hand accounts of study participants' experiences with accessing cannabis for medical purposes through various sources. Several participants recount their frustration with the lack of availability of product from the licensed producers with which they registered, and the negative impact this has had on their well-being. Some have registered under the *MMPR* in order to conform with the law, however find themselves nonetheless accessing their medicine from illegal or quasilegal sources, including dispensaries, self-production and dealers. In addition, participants who were still authorized under the *MMAR* expressed concern about the affordability of their medicine under the *MMPR*. They are finding that self-production and in some cases being supplied by a designated producer allows them to access the quantity and quality of medicine they need. They do not see the *MMPR* working for them and are concerned about the prospect of accessing cannabis without legal sanction at some time in the future.
